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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Konkan Education Society's Anandibai Pradhan Science College in the Bapusaheb Deshpande Educational Complex, Nagothane was inaugurated on 21st March 1992 at the hands of Shri Shankar Dayal Sharma, then the Vice president of India. Shri. Ram Pradhan former Governor of Arunachal Pradesh, former Secretary of Central Government and former Chief Secretary of Maharashtra State are one of the main patrons of this college. **Loknete Late Adv. Shri Datta Patil** and **Late Shri. Bapusaheb Deshpande** is the founder of the college. Now **Hon. Shri Sanjay Datta Patil** is Shouldering the responsibility as President of Konkan Education Society Alibag with **Hon. Adv. Siddharth Sanjay Patil** as a Secretary of Society.

The Konkan Education Society Alibag, Raigad is a leading and one of the oldest Educational institutions in the Konkan region and in Maharashtra, which has received the “**Adarsh Shikshan Sanstha**” Award by the Government of Maharashtra for remarkable work in the education and social field in the Year 2002-2003.

In Continuation of the march of the spreading of education, the society celebrated the "Silver Jubilee" Year on 18 December 1944 in the auspicious presence of the great educationist **Dr. Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan**.

The college is Re-Accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore with a 'B+' Grade. The college is recognized by UGC under 12(B) and 2(f) and we are getting the UGC grant in aid for college development.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College offers 03 Under-Graduate Programmes and 01 Post-Graduate Programmes

In all **204** courses/papers are offered by the college across UG and PG level programmes.

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is implemented at UG and PG level programmes as per the guidelines of UGC and University of Mumbai. The Programmes are run to achieve stated Vision, Mission and Objectives of the college as per the values propounded by the parent institution.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal evaluation. 09 Certificate/Diploma/Career Oriented/Skill Based courses were offered during the last five years. 639 students were enrolled in Certificate/Diploma/Career Oriented/Skill Based courses during the last five-years. 24.79 % students enrolled in Certificate/ Add-on/Value added programs as against the total number of students during the last five years.

The college integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum of UG and PG Programmes.

248 students undertook project work/field work /internships in the latest completed academic year 2021-22.

Percentage of students undertaking project work/field work/ internships in the year was 46.88. Curriculum of traditional UG and PG level programmes is designed by University of Mumbai with stated Programme and Course Outcomes. The academic departments of the college has prepared Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes as per the curriculum of respective domain subject. The college obtained feedback on the academic performance and ambience of the institution from various stakeholders, such as Students, Teachers, Employers and Alumni and action taken report on the feedback is made available on institutional website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution works as per its vision statement: “Education to students in the down trodden Community for development of Society through Quality Education”. The college ensures quality education to all classes of society as per its vision statement through provision of required facilities for effective teaching, learning and evaluation processes adopted. The majority of students enrolled in the college belong to backward sections of the society; hence, the college takes sincere efforts to uplift their socio-economic standard by providing quality education. 81.57 % students are enrolled against sanctioned seats during the assessment period. The college strictly follows reservation policy for admissions of students laid down by the State Govt. of Maharashtra. 78.69% seats were filled against seats reserved for various categories as per applicable reservation policy during the last five years.

Student – Full time Teacher Ratio during the latest completed academic year was 1:20.35

The faculty members of college have adopted and implemented various teaching methods to make learning more student-centric. The college provides support structures and systems for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students. The various experiential learning methods, participative learning method, problems solving

method are adopted by faculty members to make the teaching-learning process more students centric and enhance learning experiences. (Kindly refer 2.3.1)

The college has experienced and qualified faculty. Percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years was 78.18%. Further, percentage of full time teachers with

NET/SET/SLET/ Ph. D. qualification during the last five years was 43.41%.

The college is keen towards its evaluation process and reforms as per the guidelines of University of Mumbai. It adopts transparent mechanism for internal/external assessment. The grievance redressal system adopted by the college is time- bound and efficient. (Kindly refer 2.5.1) Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on institutional Website. The Attainment of POs and COs are evaluated through formal and informal methods.

Pass percentage of Students during last five years is 89.71%.

The IQAC of the college has institutionalized the Student Satisfaction Survey to avail feedback on the teaching, learning and evaluation process and measure the satisfaction level of the students. The IQAC conducted Student Satisfaction Survey every year during the assessment period and took corrective measures for quality improvement and its sustenance.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has received a grant of Rs. 22.4 Lakhs from Government and non-governmental agencies for research projects/endowments in the institution during the last five years.

The college has created an ecosystem for innovations and taken initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge. The faculty of the college has filled 01 Patent.

The College has 03 recognized Ph.D. research Guides in the subjects of Chemistry and Botany There are separate laboratories in the college for UG and PG [M.Sc. in Chemistry]

13 workshops/seminars/conferences/webinars were conducted during the last five years.

The faculty members published in all 77 research papers in National International Journals during the last five years. 21 books and chapters in edited volumes/books and papers in national/ international conference proceedings were published during last five years.

175 extension and outreach activities were carried out in the neighbourhood community sensitizing students to social issues for their holistic development by Academic departments and support services like NSS and WDC (Kindly refer 3.4.1)

18 awards /recognitions have been accorded by government/ government recognized bodies to the college and faculty for extension activities during last five years. (Kindly refer 3.4.2)

Through 25 MOUs collaborations/linkages for Faculty exchange, Student exchange, Internship, Field trip, On-the- job training, research and other academic activities were fostered by the college during the last five years.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has located on Mumbai- Goa Highway. The total area of plot used for college building is 1832.13 sq. m. Detail of open space on the four side of college building is 2725.50 sq. m. There is an adequate physical infrastructure in terms of classrooms, laboratories, and library and computer labs to cater to the academic needs of all the students. There are 9 ICT enabled classrooms and a seminar hall with seating capacity of 210 for organisation of functions, meeting, seminars, conferences.

The college has two separate building first building occupied with Administration office, Principal Cabin, IQAC Centre, Exam Section, Chemistry UG, PG Laboratories, 2 Computer lab with 52 Computers for CS/IT courses, Library, 6 classrooms

The second building of college has Botany, Zoology, Physics laboratories and 3 classrooms. There are 62 computers in the college 52 computer used for CS/IT lab 3 computer used for library, 2 for departments, 2 for examination, 3 for administration office.

The college also have separate building for Gymkhana and indoor sport.

VARIOUS SECTION AND CENTRE: The college has Health Center, Canteen facility, HOD Cabins, NSS office, Examination Section, Reprographic Centre in library, Common staff rooms, Ladies Rooms, Separate Girls and Boys common rooms, , separate Parking facility for staff and students.

LIBRARY: The Institute has separate library at first floor of first building of college. The total area of library building is 2000 sq. ft. the total books collection of library is 8913.

SPORT FACILITIES: The Total area of sport complex is 190 sq. m. The Total area of playground is 27.25.50 sq. m. The Sports Complex is equipped with Multigym Unit.

Indoor Games: Table tennis, Chess, Carom, Warming exercise.

Outdoor Games: Cricket, Volleyball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, , Long Jump, High Jump and running.

Infrastructure available for Cultural activities: The College has a proactive cultural committee. The committee organizes different cultural events under Arts Circle and Youth Festival of University of Mumbai. The college has Open Auditorium having capacity of 210 students with area of 331 Sq. ft. In addition to this, college auditorium and halls in sports complex are also used for selection and practice of cultural events.

Yoga- The College celebrates International Yoga Day on 21st June every year, The Yoga training by eminent Yoga teachers is conducted for staff and students in the spacious halls

Library has good collection of Reference books, Text books Journals, Reference Source and competitive Exam books. The Library has good Infrastructure with well-equipped sitting arrangement for student. The library also has a E-library section. The library subscribes N-List database of E- Journals and E-books from INFLIBNET. Library has provided a various service to the students and staff

Total Carpet Area of the central Library is 2000 sq. ft.

Total Collection of Central Library: The central library of the college has collection of 8913 Books, which includes reference books-, text Books, Reference sources. Competitive exam books

SOUL3.0 -developed by INFLIBNET, Gujrat is used for Automation of Library. Library is fully automated using modules such as OPAC, Acquisition, Serial Control and Issue Return.

These digital platform includes remote access to digital collection, INFLIBNET N-LIST, MAT journal of Computer science and Information Technology, Institutional Repository and E-Resources.

Inflibnet-N-List Consortia: The central library of college is regular member of Inflibnet N-List Consortia. Access to this program is permissible to all faculty and students. Through this Program various types of E-Resources like e-Books and e-Journals are available at free of cost

Subscription to Periodicals: The central library regularly subscribes 26 periodicals and magazines, which includes 11 Academic Journals and 15 Magazines related to Curricular and Competitive Exams. 10 Daily Newspapers are made available in reading hall.

Services Available in Central Library: Access of online journals through INFLIBNET Database subscribe by library, Book Lending service, Reprography Centre, extended reading room facility, Internet searching and printing, Reference service, Inter Library Loan, Free Wi-Fi Facility.

Computer and Laptops: There are total 62 desktop computers and 10 laptops in the college. Whenever needed the configuration of computers in departments like Information Technology (IT) is upgraded with the change in university curriculum. Presently, these computers have high-end configuration as i3 Processor, 4 GB RAM, 500 GB HDD. Networking of these computers of the college is done using 24 port switches and D-Link router. As the campus is divided in several buildings and new facilities have come up in last 5 years, different LANs were set as per the requirement. Backup in form of 6 KVA UPS is available for all computers. Office automation- Windows 10 and Windows 11 used with higher configuration. Windows 10 and Windows 11 more facilities to handle students' data, exam data, accounting operations and university requirements. It has helped the administrative as well as academic section to generate the required output which is in turn has helped the digitalization at all levels

Software Purchase: - The Institute has purchase windows software and other various software for CS/IT practical section.

SOUL3.0: - developed by INFLIBNET, Gujrat is used for Automation of Library. Library is fully automated using modules such as OPAC, Acquisition, Serial Control and Issue Return.

During Covid-19 lockdown period, the teaching learning process is completely online. To meet the requirement of online teaching-learning process, the college has used Microsoft team App, ZOOM App and WebEx APP. Microsys software is used for Examination Result prepare of all UG and PG classes.

Student Support and Progression

The college strongly believes that students are the pivotal stakeholder of the education system. It strives sincerely to attain the overall development of all the enrolled students by strengthening support mechanisms and attain their progression in terms of academic results, achievements and active participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

The college has availed government and non-government scholarships to the eligible students. 451 students have received govt. and non-government scholarships during last five years. Percentage of students benefited

by scholarships and free ships provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies during last five years is 17.49%. Capacity building and skills enhancement initiatives taken by the college. Organization of Yoga training programmes, provision of gymn facility, provision of Health Centre, organization of free health check-up camps and provision of vending machines in ladies rooms are the major initiatives taken by the college for the health and hygiene of enrolled students. ICT/Computing skills are inculcated among students by providing required training and ICT facility. The college has made provision of 62 computers with 20 MPBS bandwidth connectivity to strengthen ICT/Computing Skills of the students.

271 students benefitted by guidance for competitive examinations and career counselling offered by the Institution. The Institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. 40 students were placed through campus and off campus placement drives during the assessment period.

191 students were progressed to higher education.

Percentage of placement of outgoing students and students progressing to higher education during the last five years is 22.39. 01 students qualified in state level SLET examinations.

12 awards/medals have been achieved by the students for outstanding performance in sports/ cultural activities at the university/state/national/international level. The students participated in 583 sports and cultural programs organized by the college and other institutes during the assessment period. Per year, the average of the same is 116.4. The College has a proactive Alumni Association Committee. Alumni of the college have donated **Rs. 5,68,540.20** /- for the development of the college during the assessment period.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance.

There is an admirable coordination between the Sanstha management, college development committee(CDC), Principal and staff of the college which implements quality related policies and plans effectively for quality improvement and its sustenance.

The Governing Body decentralizes the administration as per the constitution for the betterment of the institution by appointing management representative on College Development Committee.

The Perspective Plan of the Institute is prepared with the quality indicators of NAAC and in

Consultation with the Sanstha management, College Development Committee, IQAC, Administrative staff, faculty, alumni and student representatives.

The college promotes decentralization and participative management through involvement of all its stakeholders. The Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, HOD's, Head Clerk and support staff look after academic and administrative leadership of the college.

The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient. The college follows the policies framed by UGC, State Government of Maharashtra, University of Mumbai, NAAC and the Parent Institution.

The college implements e-governance in areas of operation such as Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support and Examination.

The parent institute and the college has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff. (Kindly refer 6.3.1)

Percentage of teachers provided with financial support to attend conferences/workshops and towards membership fee of professional bodies during the last five years is 0.78.

Percentage of teaching and non-teaching staff participating in Faculty development Programmes (FDP), professional development/administrative training programs during the last five years is 31.78.

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/non-government organizations) and it conducts internal and external financial audits regularly.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities. (Kindly refer 6.5.1)

Quality assurance initiatives of the institution include regular meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell, collection of Feedback from stakeholders, analysis of the feedback collected and use of the suggestions for improvements, take collaborative quality initiatives with other institution(s). Participation in NIRF and conduct of quality audit/accreditation by recognized state, national or international agencies such as NAAC and other Certification.

To distribute registration forms to missed out students and collect the same with the required documents. 5. To submit the collected registration forms and documents to Tehsil Office, Roha for further process. 6. With the help of NSS volunteers, NSS Program Officers co-ordinate the practice and conduct programs for registration purposes or submit duly filled out forms to the competent authority for further process.</p>

Response:

Admission -In our college First-year admission process is started after the declaration of H.S.C results immediately. The admission committee prepares the merit list as per the government norms, with this merit list the students are admitted strictly on their merit marks. Similarly, the PG admissions are started after the declaration of T. Y. B. Sc. results. The S.Y.B. Sc. and T.Y.B. Sc. admissions are completed just after the declaration of the result.

Administration:-The Principal and IQAC of the institute look after the attendance of regular and temporary faculty, which helps in the monthly salary payment of all the employees. They also maintain and follow the easy and effective official interaction with the college and with the university.

Attendance:- Institute has a mechanism to record the attendance of theory classes and practicals for all UG and PG courses.

Examination:-Exam committee looks after the appointment of examiners, collection of the question papers, conduction of exams and declaration of results using the CGPA system adopted by the parent university. Exams are conducted on behalf of the college for the first two years of the degree course and final year the exam is conducted on behalf of the university for the UG and PG course. During the Covid-19 pandemic, colleges conducted all exams as an online pattern through Google form using mobile students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The mechanism of internal assessment in the institution is transparent and robust. It follows the regulations and guidelines of the University of Mumbai for the internal evaluation process of theory and practical examinations. At the beginning of the academic session, IQAC of the college prepares a yearly calendar with the consultation of all the heads of departments for smooth and effective implementation of internal assessment. The process of conducting internal assessments and examinations is also informed to students during the orientation/induction program. The program of internal assessment is prepared and posted on the Institution's website & WhatsApp group of respective classes and circulated for staff and students.

Institute provides sample questions of each course on the institute website and WhatsApp groups to enable the students about the pattern of the questions. Institute also provides a question bank of each course for Practical Viva-voce Examinations to the students which helped them to get the correct essence of the questions asked in practical examination. In first term of the academic year, internal assessments are taken online due to the Covid-19 pandemic but in the second term internal examinations are taken offline. During online assignment/examination if students face any technical or internet issue and if it is communicated

immediately to the Principal of the institute then their re-assignment / re-examination is also conducted as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai. Due care and the track are maintained till the submission/completion of assignments during online examinations

Mostly grievances related to the examination are received after declaration of results or after convocation ceremony. The Institute follows well defined mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances and is transparent, time bound and efficient as given below:

1. Institute follows transparent mechanism developed by the provision of separate Examination Committee and Unfair Means Committee.
2. After receiving the grievances related internal examination from the students, the examination committee verifies the same and takes necessary measures stipulated time. The process is time bounded and efficient. As per the University Guidelines and nature of grievances, the process is completed within one or two weeks. College-related grievances are mostly resolved in a day or two.
3. Discrepancies in name especially correction in Devanagari's name on the Convocation Certificate, selection of course, course code, late fees, etc. are forwarded to the University for necessary corrections in due time. Grievances related to verification of marks are forwarded to the University for authentication and necessary action. Issues of absentee, submission of project/assignment, marks awarded etc., notify to the concerned subject teacher / HoD / Examination In-charge. The continuous communication is maintained by the Principal and Examination In-charge with the university authorities for speedy disposal of queries and doubts if any. As per internal or practical examinations are concerned, if any student pin points any academic discrepancy during conduct of tests / examination, the concerned teachers / Examination Committee / Principal wholeheartedly show their concern and attention is given to the student's grievances.

The performance of students is monitored and evaluated for measuring the attainment of PO, PSO and CO through internal, external evaluation, and placement, progression to higher studies and skill development.

The college follows formal and informal mechanisms for the measurement of attainment of the learning outcomes; however, the attainment is computed mainly by considering formal mechanism.

Formal Mechanism (Direct Method):

Pass Percentage: The evaluation of attainment of CO of the department is done by the marks/grades obtained by the students in the final semester end examination of each course (paper) of the programme and pass percentage of the students in the final semester end university examination of the programme.

Feedback from Students: Every department of the college collects the feedback from passed out final year students on attainment of PO through the survey form. The analysis of feedback collected from students was done by respective department and report of the same is prepared.

Informal Mechanism (Indirect Method): Attainment of PO and CO are also evaluated through the Class tests, classroom interactions, attendance, group discussion, research project, viva-voce and competitions. As the campus is divided in several buildings and new facilities have come up in last 5 years, different LANs were set as per the requirement. Backup in form of 6 KVA UPS is available for all computers

It has helped the administrative as well as academic section to generate the required output which is in turn has helped the digitalization at all levels
